Negotiating ecosystem services

▶ Trade-offs between stakeholders

- ▶ Because interests differ: fuelwood versus paper industry.
- Over rules access, and boundaries.
- Due to differences in power

▶ Indian context for ecosystem service trade-offs

- ► 'Indian political system must be ready to make tough choices and trade-offs': Jairam Ramesh January 2011
- ▶ These are political choices, no easy 'techno-fix











Winners and losers from ecosystem change – its not always 'win-win'

- Changes (improvements?) in ecosystem management often involve the exclusion of groups (e.g. Protected Areas & displacement)
- Improvements in ecosystem services (e.g. drinking water) may be captured disproportionately by the wealthy/powerful
- Negative impacts affect actors unequally, and are often hidden; we need to look for these!
- Those directly affected are often highly vulnerable and lack adaptive capacity (especially women)













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
